### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

***"Who aims at excellence will be above mediocrity; who aims at mediocrity will be far short of it."***

I hope that everyone has had an enjoyable and safe summer. Summer is a great time of year to relax a little, take advantage of all the great opportunities that Long Island has to offer, reflect on our past year and set new goals for the upcoming year. As we approach the end of the summer and enter a new school year, it is at this time when I encourage each student to create goals for themselves. Goal setting is a powerful process for thinking about your future and for motivating yourself to turn your vision of this future into reality.

Therefore, setting goals for yourself is not only a great challenge, but it will also help give you focus and direction for the upcoming year. By knowing precisely what you want to achieve, you know where you have to concentrate your efforts. It will also help you quickly spot the distractions that can so easily lead you astray. Your goals should be specific in nature, measureable, attainable, realistic, and include a time frame. Therefore, I challenge every student who will be part of the high school community to take some time and create goals for the 2011-12 school year.

Over the course of the next year, our goal as a high school staff is not only to encourage each and every student to challenge him/herself to the fullest and pursue an Advanced Regents Diploma, but also to grow socially and emotionally. Our goal is to provide an education that develops critical thought, analytical problem solving, leadership and citizenship type skills. Therefore, I encourage students to take risks, ask questions, get involved in both the school and community and "aim for excellence".

As I reflect on the 2010-11 school year, let me share some impressive facts and information from last year's seniors with you. On graduation day, there were one hundred ninety-one seniors receiving diplomas, 99% of whom received that diploma with a Regents endorsement. Of that 99%, one hundred and eighteen students, or 60%, received that diploma with an Advanced Regents endorsement; and of that 60%, 55% received that diploma with an Advanced Regents Diploma with Honors endorsement, which means that those students maintained an average of 90 or better on their NYS Regents Exams. 62% of

the class, or one hundred and eighteen students, went on to attend four-year colleges and universities; 28%, or 51 students, attended two year colleges; 2 of our students attended United States military academies, one student joined the armed forces, 4 students went on to trade school and 3 students went on to full-time employment.

Athletically, last year's senior class played a major role in the success of the high school. A few of those accomplishments were:

- 18 varsity teams qualified for the playoffs
- 10 League Champions
- 6 Division Champions
- 5 Suffolk County Champions
- 1 Long Island Champion
- 2 New York State finalists
- 16 teams were recognized as scholar athlete teams
- 11 seniors signed national letters of intent to play at the college level

This class was also instrumental in all of the very successful concerts, art exhibitions and our High School Musical. For example, six seniors were selected to participate in the All-County Music Festivals. Two seniors were selected to participate in the LISFA Festival. Two seniors were selected to participate in the NYSSMA All-State Music Festival and one student was selected as an alternate. Two seniors received nominations for the Islip Town Arts Council, "Teeny Awards", for their outstanding artistic and theatrical abilities in this year's high school musical, Brigadoon and ten seniors received accolades at various town and county art festivals, to name a few. Within this class, we also had one senior who decided to challenge herself by spending a full year in Japan and totally immersing herself in the Japanese culture.

Academic accomplishments include, but are not limited to, our excellent Regents results. In order to receive a Regents Diploma, students are required to pass five N.Y.S. Regents with a score of 65 or better. The following is a list of those required Regents, along with the percentage of students that passed each of the required exams this past June.

English	99%
Integrated Algebra	93%
Living Environment	99%
Global History & Geography	96%
U.S. History	100%

These results are truly impressive and are a tribute to the students, parents and the teachers. It is due to the collaborative efforts of everyone involved that our students are able to perform at the level they do. Needless to say, I am extremely proud of our teachers and students alike. It is because of a strong commitment from students, teachers and parents that we are able to raise the bar for everyone, which we will continue to do. ## **REVISED & NEW PROCEDURES**

### **BREAKFAST/LUNCH**

This year, the district will be operating its own food service program, as opposed to contracting it out, as in the past. Therefore, for the first time, the high school cafeteria will be serving breakfast between 7:15am and 9:30am. I am also happy to share that not only has the menu expanded, but the food being served will be of a higher quality. **With our new food service program in place and safety always a concern, the privilege of going out to lunch will be reserved for 12<sup>th</sup> grade students only.** Lunch will be served during their normal periods, 4-7. The cafeteria will also be open to the students periods 8 and 9 for various snacks.

### **PROGRESS REPORTS/REPORT CARDS**

As was done for the second half of the past school year, we will continue to utilize technology and reduce the use of paper by making all progress reports and report cards for the 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> quarters available via the Parent Portal of our student management system. Therefore, only the 4<sup>th</sup> quarter report cards will be mailed home. If at any time you would like a paper copy of any of the other report cards or progress reports, please contact the high School's Counseling Center. ## ATTENDANCE POLICY

The High School Attendance Policy has been revised. For your convenience, a copy of the revised policy has been included in your summer packet or it can be viewed and/or downloaded at the Bayport-Blue Point High School website. (www.bbbschools.org)

## STUDY HALLS

In accordance with the High School practice of doing away with study halls, students will be scheduled for a full nine period day. Every effort has been and will be made to adjust student schedules while still meeting their course requests.

## OTHER IMPORTANT HIGH SCHOOL INFORMATION & PROCEDURES

### EARLY DISMISSAL

All students must obtain official approval for an early dismissal. Doctor, dental, and personal appointments should be made after school hours. However, in an emergency, an early dismissal can be granted under the following conditions:

1. A note from the parent or guardian must be presented to the Attendance Office **BEFORE FIRST PERIOD** indicating the specific reason for the request and the time of the dismissal.
2. This note must have a telephone number of a parent or guardian. The Attendance Office will call to verify the request for an early dismissal. In the event that a student becomes ill during the day, the student must obtain a pass to the Nurse's Office. Only the nurse may clear a student to go home due to illness. The parent must also sign the student out through the Attendance Office.
3. In accordance with Board Policy, ninth, tenth and eleventh grade students are not permitted to leave the school building during their assigned lunch period for any reason. Students who are in 12<sup>th</sup> grade are permitted to leave the school building during their assigned lunch period (Period 4, 5, 6, or 7) and/or during their assigned senior privilege period (1 or 9), if applicable.

### PASSES

Whenever a student is in the hall during a 40 minute period class, he/she should have his/her planner or a pass. A student must obtain a pass from his/her teacher or have his/her student planner signed prior to going to the nurse, the counseling center, school psychologist, etc., including during an assigned lunch period. Passes given out in

homeroom must be shown to the subject teacher **PRIOR** to reporting to the location indicated on the pass. Hall monitors will be requesting to see Student Planners and/or passes from students. If a student refuses to follow the directions of the hall monitor and/or any high school personnel, he/she will be brought directly to the assistant principal's office for immediate discipline.

## SCHEDULE CHANGES

The deadline for enrolling in a new course is through the fifth week of any semester. Dropping a course during this time will not result in a notation on the student transcript. Any withdrawal after such period will result in the student receiving a WF (withdrawal failing), unless the principal reviews the request and approves a WP (withdrawal passing). In either situation, a notation will be made on the student's transcript (WP or WF). If a WF is recorded, the actual grade will be recorded on the student transcript and counted towards his/her ranking and included in his/her GPA.

## STUDENT IDENTIFICATION

All students must carry their school-issued identification card with them at all times. Seniors will need to present their school-issued identification card in order to exit and enter the building through the cafeteria for lunch. Missing cards should be reported to the assistant principal's office (Rm. 111).

These cards are very important in maintaining accurate communication with parents in the event of illness or emergency. They will be distributed in school and should be returned to the nurse's office ASAP, but no later than **Monday, September 12th**. Your cooperation with this request is deeply appreciated.

## **INTERNET POLICY**

Since all classrooms have access to the Internet, our students will be able to avail themselves of this valuable tool. The Board of Education has approved an Internet use policy, which is enclosed. If you **do not** wish to have your child participate in the use of the Internet, please return the enclosed form to the assistant principal's office, (Mr. Robert Haas, Rm. 116) by **Monday, September 12.**

## **BOCES**

Classes will begin on **Wednesday, September 7.** Buses to Islip, Brookhaven and Riverhead Technical Centers will be provided.

The morning BOCES students must be at the high school by 7:05.

## **BUS INFORMATION**

If you are eligible for a bus pass, it will be mailed home in late August. If you do not have your pass, the bus driver does have the right to deny permission to ride on the bus. All questions regarding bus passes should be directed to the District Office.

## **LUNCH PRIVILEGES**

### **OPEN LUNCH**

**Only twelfth grade students may leave campus for lunch (Periods 4, 5, 6 or 7) during the school year. All other students are required by Board policy to remain on school grounds in the school building.** Students violating this policy will receive a discipline referral and one extended detention. Consistent abusers of this policy will be assigned additional disciplinary actions. **A parent may restrict his or her child to campus by forwarding a letter to Mr. Zarcone indicating such.** We will then arrange for your child to remain on campus during this time period.

**The open campus lunch period is a privilege that will be revoked for any senior who fails to exercise appropriate responsibility regarding behavior or does not return to school on time for his/her next period.**

The Out-To-Lunch Policy is a privilege that is granted to senior students during their assigned lunch period and includes the following responsibilities:

- **Twelfth grade students must present his/her student identification card in order to enter and exit the cafeteria.**
- Be considerate of people's property and of other members of the community.
- Behave responsibly, since you are representing Bayport-Blue Point High School, your family, and yourself.
- Upon returning to school grounds, please

quietly report to the cafeteria and wait until the bell signals for the change of periods.

- In the event that you become ill while out to lunch, you must have a parent or guardian call at that time to confirm your illness or it will be considered a cut.
- **DO NOT ABUSE THIS PRIVILEGE** or you will forfeit the right to exercise it.
- Seniors are to exit the school property through the parking lot located on the north side of the building.
- Seniors must return to school through the parking lot and enter the cafeteria to await the bell indicating they are to proceed to their next class.
- Seniors who are permitted to leave campus during their assigned lunch period are not permitted in the halls during this time.

## **FREE AND REDUCED MEAL INFORMATION**

Attached please find copies of the Free and Reduced Meal Information form. I would ask that you review the attached form and if you think you qualify, please complete and return it to the main office as soon as possible.

## **PARKING ON CAMPUS**

All 12<sup>th</sup> grade students who possess a valid Class D driver's license will be permitted to park in the student parking lot located in the north parking lot during the first week of school. Students will be required to show their license to security upon entering the parking lot during these days. Beginning on Monday, September 12<sup>th</sup>, only students who possess a valid school-issued parking permit will be permitted to park on school grounds. Parking permit applications will be available in Rm. 111 during regular school hours, beginning on the first day of school.

## **EQUIPMENT**

Equipment (non-instructional) must not be brought to school or used on school grounds; i.e. **CELLULAR TELEPHONES WITH PICTURE AND/OR DIGITAL OR VIDEO RECORDERS OR TEXT MESSAGING, PALM PILOTS, BLACKBERRIES, SKATEBOARDS, BOX RADIOS, BEEPERS, LASER POINTERS, MP3 PLAYERS, CD PLAYERS, WALKMANS, ANY TOY THAT CAN BE MISTAKEN FOR A WEAPON** and any other items deemed to be a distraction to the school environment. Equipment of this nature does not contribute to an atmosphere for learning and often presents a distraction that is detrimental to the school's purpose. If a student is found to have any of the above-mentioned items on his/her person, a faculty or staff member will confiscate it.

- **First offense** – the student may pick the item up from one of the high school administrators after school.
- **Second offense** – The parent must pick the item up from one of the assistant principals' offices.

The use of a CELLULAR TELEPHONE is not permitted during regular school hours, which are from 7:40 a.m. to 2:26 p.m. If parents need to contact their children during the school day, please call 472-7800.

### SENIOR PRIVILEGES

In order to be eligible for a senior privilege (periods 1 or 9 only), seniors must have completed a minimum of 16.5 credits and currently be enrolled in at least 6 1/2 credit-bearing classes. In addition, privileges will be awarded only to those who are passing all subjects and have not received any discipline referrals for the past five weeks of school. Students who have met the above guidelines and did not receive any discipline referrals for the entire fourth quarter of their junior year of school may start their senior year of school with a senior privilege. **Eligibility status for all seniors will be reviewed at five-week intervals.** Only those students who meet these guidelines will be eligible for senior privileges.

### ALCOHOL, DRUGS & FIGHTING

The use and possession of controlled substances, such as drugs and alcohol, constitute a most serious threat to the safety and welfare of the entire student population. Please visit the district website to read the "Alcohol Consumption by Students-Alcohol Testing of Students" Policy.

Similarly, fighting, whether on or off the school grounds, is a behavior that cannot be tolerated. Therefore, infractions of the rules governing these issues will result in the maximum penalty allowable, including a five-day, out-of-school suspension and possible intervention by a law enforcement agency.

### STUDENT CUTTING & DISCIPLINE

Over 30% of all referrals to the assistant principal's office are written for students who have cut classes. This represents a serious impediment to student achievement. As a result, the School Discipline Committee and the School Improvement Team have endorsed the following student cutting policy:

- Students who cut class, lunch or study hall, will be assigned one extended detention.
- There will be no special consideration given to students who participate in extracurricular activities, take driver education or work after school. The only exception to this will be made for those students who can verify a financial hardship and are contributing to the support of

their household. Verification must be in writing from the student's parent/guardian and then other

- arrangements will be made.
- Students will be assigned the day they are to serve their discipline. There will be **no rescheduling** of discipline obligations without parental consent verbally and in writing prior to the date of the detention.
- Discipline obligations that are not served due to legal absences from school will be served the next school day that the student attends. It is the student's responsibility to remember and serve his/her discipline obligation. Any obligations that go unserved will be subject to further disciplinary consequences.

### EXTRACURRICULAR ELIGIBILITY POLICY

Since 1994, the high school has implemented an Extracurricular Eligibility Policy. The policy details the eligibility guidelines for students who wish to participate in extracurricular activities. Any student who wishes to participate in extracurricular activities during the 2011-12 school year is required to submit a copy of the policy signed by the student and a parent/guardian and returned to his/her coach or advisor. Attached is a copy of this policy.

### LATE ARRIVALS TO SCHOOL

**It is the responsibility of the parents to contact the high school attendance office (472-7800, Ext. 5014) to inform school personnel of student absences.** If a student is absent, he/she must bring an absence note signed by a parent or guardian stating the reason for the absence. This note must be given to the **attendance office the day the student returns to school** or the absence will be considered **unexcused.**

### STUDENT DRESS CODE

All students are expected to give proper attention to personal cleanliness and dress appropriately for school and school functions.

A student's dress, grooming and appearance, including hair style/color, jewelry, make-up and nails, shall:

- Be safe, appropriate and not disrupt or interfere with the educational process.
- Recognize that extremely brief garments are inappropriate and unacceptable. This includes, but is not limited to, the following: backless tops, single-shoulder tops, tube tops, halter tops, spaghetti straps, see-through, sheer or transparent shirts/pants, exposed midriffs, plunging necklines (front and/or back), skirts/shorts above mid-thigh length, shorts that are excessively revealing and

net/mesh garments. Tank tops should not have spaghetti straps, plunging necklines or expose the midriff or undergarments.

- Ensure that underwear is completely covered with outer clothing.
- Include footwear at all times. Footwear that is a safety hazard will not be allowed.
- Not include the wearing of hoods in the classroom except for a medical or religious purpose.
- Not include items that are vulgar, obscene and libelous or denigrate others on account of race, color, religion, creed, national origin, gender, sexual orientation or disability.
- Not promote and/or endorse the use of alcohol, tobacco or illegal drugs and/or encourage other illegal or violent activities.

**Remember that faculty and staff have the right to limit the wearing of hats during their instructional time with students.**

Students who violate the student dress code shall be required to modify their appearance by covering or removing the offending item and, if necessary or practical, replacing it with an acceptable item. Any student who refuses to do so shall be subject to discipline, up to and including in-school suspension for the day. Any student who repeatedly fails to comply with the dress code shall be subject to further discipline, up to and including out-of-school suspension.

### **LOCKERS**

All students are provided with lockers to store personal belongings and school-related materials. Students should not share the locker combination with anyone. Lockers should be kept closed at all times. Students should not leave the locker “preset” to open and valuables should never be brought to school. In addition, all students are reminded to lock their belongings in the physical education locker room during physical education classes. All assigned lockers remain the property of the school district and the school reserves the right to inspect any locker at any time. Bayport-Blue Point High School and School District are not responsible for stolen items.

### **SMOKING / TOBACCO**

In accordance with New York State and Suffolk County Public Health Laws, Bayport-Blue Point High School is a smoke-free campus. Smoking on all district owned and operated campuses is prohibited. There shall be no smoking on school buses or buses chartered for school activities. These prohibitions include employees, visitors, guests and students.

Students are also prohibited to be in possession of tobacco and/or tobacco products while on school grounds. Students who violate either policy will be subject to the following procedure:

#### **Guideline for High School Disciplinary Action**

<b><u>Infraction</u></b>	<b><u>Disposition</u></b>
<b>Smoking on school property</b>	- Suspension (ISS to OSS) - Referral to Suffolk County Department of Health (\$50 to \$500 fine) - Attendance at smoking clinic
<b>Possession of tobacco products</b>	- Suspension (ISS to OSS) - Community Service

\*\*\*Further violations may result in substantial fines levied by the Suffolk County Health Department. The number of violations is cumulative from one school year to the next.

A copy of the high school Smoke-Free Campus Policy is available in the assistant principals' offices.

### **NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY REQUIREMENTS**

Membership in the National Honor Society is not solely based on grade point average. Rather, it shall be determined after an evaluation by a faculty committee of the following qualities exhibited by each candidate. Students shall submit evidence of their achievements in their application and high school staff will be asked to share their observations, as well. The faculty advisors will then present these findings, with all mention of the students' names removed, to the committee for discussion. **It should be noted that the committee will reconvene periodically throughout the school year to assure that National Honor Society members have continued to uphold the principles listed below. If a student's average falls below 90, exhibits inappropriate behavior, or fails to fulfill leadership or service commitments, his/her membership may be revoked.**

- **Scholarship** – A candidate's unweighted average, from freshman year to and including second quarter of junior year, must be 89.5 or above. Any student selected for the National Honor Society must continue to maintain the 89.5 or above average or be subject to removal.
- **Service** – A candidate must have provided a service consistently over a relatively long period of time or should have completed several shorter termed good deeds for no remuneration or credit. These helpful actions should take place in the school community – tutoring on a regular basis,

assisting a teacher or coach, being part of the several projects such as Athletes Helping Athletes. A candidate may also share of himself / herself within the community at large doing things such as helping in the numerous church projects, volunteering at a hospital, being a part of the projects of the Girl Scouts or Boy Scouts, helping to coach teams of younger children. Service may also find its way into the neighborhood where one can baby-sit for no money or rake or cut the lawn of a person who is unable. Service that one provides at home for someone in his/her family is not counted unless the candidate works to help support the family.

- **Leadership** – Leadership is not only having a leader’s title; it may also be seen as the person who can effectively become a leader within a situation such as leading within a class, a team, a group of friends.
- **Character** – A candidate should be that person who is capable of making the tough decision, who understands his/her own intrinsic values, morals, and principles and is capable of leading his life based on these.

#### **REQUIREMENTS TO ENTER AP / HONORS CLASSES**

Student placement in AP sections depends upon his/her performance in class as well as teacher recommendation. First and second quarter grades, along with midterm scores, will be evaluated. In addition, teachers will be asked to rate students according to the following categories:

- Exhibits insight into cause-effect relationships.
- Makes valid generalizations from concepts and ideas learned.
- Transfers learning from one area to another.
- Works independently with minimal intervention.
- Demonstrates the ability to organize ideas, tasks.
- Is eager to learn.
- Shows creativity in solving problems.
- Expresses self well orally or in writing.
- Contributes positively to the learning environment.
- Completes and hands in assignments in a timely manner.
